- 1. All of us do some kind of work to ward off starvation or to gain sufficient material wealth with a view to maintaining that standard of living which our physical and intellectual powers have helped us to reach. But there is another kind of work which is completely divorced from the burdensome process of our livelihood and which is undertaken for the sake of amusement or interest on the direction of our surplus stores of energy in some new and useful channels of refined tastes. This delightful occupation, combining work with pleasure or hobby, as it is properly termed, called for the application of our highest faculties gives proper form to our healthy instincts, purposeful habits and disciplined behaviour. In our carefree and vacant hours it allows these facilities to perform their natural functions and to display their instinctive greatness. We devote our leisure time to the pursuit of this pleasant task and derive advantages which compare favourably with those we obtain from the burdening routine of our daily life. Hobbies widen the sphere of our cultural activities, gives refinement to our tastes and show us the path that leads to our systematic mental and moral development. Our tendencies and inclinations also find in them an outlet for a healthy and progressive expression.
- 2. "A hobby is a favourite subject or occupation that is not one's main business." In this age of machinery which has taken upon itself most of the laborious duties of physical exertion formally performed by man, then creating for him pleasant intervals of rest and leisure, it should not be difficult for him to devote some time to the pursuit of a new interest that can add some charm, colour or zest to his life. The spare time must not be frittered away in idleness or spent on such work that overtakes his mind and body after they have performed their normal functions for the day. The new interest will be worthwhile only if it provides relaxation and change from ordinary occupation, banishes the drabness of routine work and produces a feeling that life is both charming and meaningful.
- 3. The choice of hobbies, like the choice of books, is not an easy task. Some hobbies demand a little guidance from experienced persons. Some hobbies are rather expensive, and, therefore, beyond the means of ordinary people who can ill afford to spend large sums of money on them. A few are incompatible with our temperament and taste. We must not, therefore, allow the glamour of certain hobbies to blind their reality, howsoever tempting they may appear to us, nor should we begin to cherish them thoughtlessly because we find other people so devotedly attached to them. In the first flush of enthusiasm many have rushed into unsuitable hobbies only to find themselves turning away from them in a state of great disillusionment and thus discard them. Scattered interest in half a dozen or more odd hobbies is also not a desirable end.

- 2. Physical education promotes the importance of inclusion of a regular fitness activity in the routine. This helps the students to maintain their fitness abilities to an optimum level. Physical fitness helps to inculcate the importance of maintaining a healthy body, which in turn keeps them healthy and energised.
- Indulging in sports, be it team sports or dual or individual sports, leads to a major boost in self-3. confidence. The ability to go on the field and perform instills a sense of self confidence, which is very important for the development of a person's self-confidence. Moreover, the ability to accept defeat on field and yet believe in your own capabilities brings a sense of positive attitude as well.
- Physical education classes are about participating in the physical fitness and recreation activities, but they are also about gaining knowledge about the overall aspects of physical health. For example in today's world the problems of obesity and anaemia are rampant among teenagers. Physical education provides the benefits of nutritious food and cite the ill effects of junk food. Promoting sound eating practices and guidelines for nutrition are some of the very valuable lessons that can be taught through physical education classes at school level.

- Participation in team sports or even dual sports helps to imbibe a team spirit among the students. While participating in team sports, the children have to function as an entire team and hence they learn how to organize themselves and function together. The process of team building hones a person's overall communicative skills and the ability to get along with different kinds of people.

- Q3. Read the passage given below and answer the questions that follow: (8) In a very short period of time the internet has had a profound impact on the way we live. Since the internet was made operational in 1983, it has lowered both the costs of communication and the barriers to creative expression. It has challenged old business models and enabled new ones. It has provided access to information on a scale never before achievable.

It succeeded because we designed it as flexible and open. These two features have allowed it to accommodate innovation without massive changes to its infrastructure. An open, burdenless and standardized platform means that barriers to entry are low, competition is high, interpretability is assured and innovation is rapid.

The beauty of an open platform is that there are no gatekeepers. For centuries, access to and creation of information was controlled by the few. The internet has changed that and is rapidly becoming the platform for everyone, by everyone.

Of course, it still has a way to go. Today there are only about 2.3 billion internet users, representing roughly 30% of the world's population. Much of the information that they can access online is in English, but this is changing rapidly.

The technological progress of the internet has also set social change in motion. As with other enabling inventions before it, from the telegraph to television, some will worry about the effects of broader access to information — the printing press and the rise in literacy that it effected were, after all, long seen as destabilising. Similar concerns about the internet are occasionally raised, but if we take a long view, I'm confident that its benefits far outweigh the discomforts of learning to integrate it into our lives. The internet and the world wide web are what they are because literally millions of people have made it so. It is a grand collaboration.

It would be foolish not to acknowledge that the openness of the internet has had a price. Security is an increasingly important issue and cannot be ignored. If there is an area of vital research and development for the internet, this is one of them. I am increasingly confident, however, that techniques and practices exist to make the internet safer and more secure while retaining its essentially open quality.

After working on the internet and its predecessors for over four decades, I'm more optimistic about its promise than I have ever been. We are all free to innovate on the net everyday. The internet is a tool of the people, built by the people for the people and it must stay that way.
